# Country reports for the State of the World's Biodiversity for Food and Agriculture – experiences, outcomes and the way forward

# Strengthening women's capacity in biodiversity and nutrition through farmer field schools

## Venue and time: Iran room (B-116); 13:15 – 14:45

Organizers: Oxfam, the Netherlands

The Sowing Diversity = Harvesting Security (SD=HS) program aims to improve resilience and nutrition security of smallholder farmers and indigenous communities in the face of climate change by strengthening their management, development and access to biodiversity. At this side event, we will present findings from SD=HS studies on the nature and magnitude of seasonal hunger periods in Zimbabwe, Vietnam, and Peru. Farmer Field Schools are used to optimize utilization of biodiversity for household food and nutrition security by building on traditional knowledge. Using participatory tools, the programme assessed the role of biodiversity for farmers and in particular neglected and underutilized species (NUS) to diversify the diet and as a coping mechanism during the hunger period. Identified barriers to the full utilization of these species call for both community-based and (inter)national interventions.

## Access and Benefit-Sharing of animal genetic resources: Community protocols and other perspectives

#### Organizer: League for Pastoral Peoples and Endogenous Livestock Development (LPP)

Pastoralists provide important agro-ecosystem services, creating and managing not only a crucial part of domestic animal diversity, but also of forage and plant diversity. They produce food, especially protein, without any of the usual agricultural inputs (fuel, chemical fertilizer, pesticides, machinery) and without even tilling the soil. In countries such as India they are crucial providers of organic manure. Unfortunately this function has remained unrecognized, but Community Protocols under the Nagoya Protocol on Access and Benefit-Sharing are making this role of pastoralism increasingly visible. The presentations will highlight a landscape approach to conserving domestic animal diversity, the existing experiences with community protocols of pastoralist communities about the biodiversity they create and manage, as well as national obligations with respect to Access and Benefit-Sharing of animal genetic resources.

## The multiple benefits of realising Farmers' Rights

The side event will present the Co-chairs' summary of recommendations from the global consultation on Farmers' Rights in Bali, Indonesia 27-30 September 2016. The consultation was organised by Norway and Indonesia with facilitation by the Secretariat of the International Treaty on Plant Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture. It brought together 95 participants from 37 countries from Africa, Asia, the Near East, Latin America and the Caribbean, North America, South West Pacific, Europe, representing farmers, and farmers' organizations, NGOs, IGOs, officials from the Contracting Parties, seed industry organizations, UPOV Secretariat, researchers and academia professors. It was co-chaired by Dr Regine Andersen from Norway and Dr Carlos Correa from Argentina, addressing the following main questions: (i) why Farmers' Rights matter, (ii) what are the different challenges for realization of Farmers' Rights; and (iii) possible ways of further strengthening the realization of Farmers' Rights.
