Livestock species contribute to food and agriculture in Liberia, and they include beef cattle, small ruminants (goats, sheep), pigs and poultry. Thousands of Liberians depend on livestock and livestock products for income and livelihoods. There are two cattle breeds in Liberia and include Muturu and N'dama. There is one breed of goat, the West African Dwarf, and one breed of sheep, the Djallonke.

Some type of livestock and poultry data collection has been carried out in the Country by MOA, and NGOs like BRAC, International, Samaritan Purse and the Liberia Institute of Statistics and Geo-Information Services (LISGIS). Capacity is being developed at MOA and the Central Agricultural Research Institute (CARI) to carry out livestock characterization and develop Livestock Information Management System (LIMS) for cattle, small ruminants and pigs. Development of the indigenous livestock and chicken breeds of Liberia for AnGR development and conservation is of priority for the livestock research program of MOA and CARI.

Animal Genetic Resources in Liberia is not developed and faces serious constraints and challenges. The driving force for the effective management and conservation of AnGR of Liberia is the Government/Ministry of Agriculture (MOA). There is lack of awareness and sensitization on the part of the Government as to the importance of AnGR. Some of the main challenges encountered in the preparation of the Country Report are as follows: a. lack of livestock policy for Liberia and the formulation for legislature is in progress; b. lack of human capacity and expertise in the area of AnGR; c. lack of adequate livestock data (phenotypic and genetic and production data); d. lack of infrastructures (equipped laboratories, equipments, logistics, etc.) and e. lack of funds for research and data collection for the AnGR of Liberia. The first main strategic priority area, which is the characterization, inventory and monitoring of trends and associated risk has not started. The priorities and strategic direction for the future is for Government to support the development of the AnGR of Liberia by providing funds for research, monitoring, and characterization (phenotypic and genetic) of livestock and their production system in Liberia. This will provide the opportunity to develop the Livestock Information Management System (LIMS) and provide measures to conserve the animal genetic resources of Liberia.

Liberia has not been able to submit or contribute to the FAO's State of the World's Animal Genetics Resources (SoW-AnGR) initiative in the past, therefore this exercise presents a unique opportunity to collect, document and report the status of the AnGR in Liberia. The Government of Liberia through MOA will work with FAO in collaboration to meet the global objectives.

Pigs and poultry breeding stocks are imported from other Country, such as USA, Europe, Nigeria, Ghana and Ivory Coast. This may affect the genetic resources of these species due to cross breeding with the native stocks. The exceptions are for beef cattle and small ruminants (goats and sheep). These species are brought to Liberia from neighboring Countries for marketing and slaughter, and not imported for breeding purposes. Therefore there is no gene flow into these species that will the affect the genetic resources.

The importation poultry and pigs breeding stocks helped in the development of the commercial production because these breeds are fast growing with higher body weights. Importation of large and small ruminants from neighboring Countries for marketing is affecting the trend of livestock production in Liberia. Liberian breeds are disappearing due to the lack of conservation and preservation.
