THE FUTURE FORESTS POSTER

The Future Forests classroom poster is another useful learning tool available to you and your students. POSTER QUESTIONS AND DRAWINGS


Allow your students to examine the poster thoroughly before discussing it with them. You can use the poster to get your group thinking about their forests and trees by doing the following:

Poster questions

- ▶ Ask how the forest depicted in the poster is similar to forests in your area. Ask them how it differs
- ▶ Ask them to find foods depicted in the poster that are similar to the ones they eat.
- ▶ Ask your students what type of foods the animals and insects depicted in the poster eat, and try to compare the cartoon animals in the poster with animals found in your area.
- ▶ Work with your group to identify useful products made from forest trees and plants. Be creative and relate the products to ones that you are familiar with.
- ▶ List the products [forest products depicted in the poster and ask your students how many of the items listed can be found in their community.

Poster drawings


- ▶ Try drawing a food chain using characters from the poster and showing who eats whom. Try starting the chain with plants and ending with people. Ask your students what will happen if you remove something from the chain.
- ▶ The people in the picture have just come from a meeting to decide how to use their forest. If you and your students were to draw a similar picture for your local forest, who would you include in the picture?
- ▶ Ask your students if they could draw a poster showing the many uses of forests in their area. Begin by making a list of the uses of forests and trees in your community.




TEACHER'S RESOURCE


