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












The Paradox of Public Food


- Public procurement as one of the most powerful instruments governments have at their disposal to fashion sustainable economies
 - 9 16% of the EU's gross domestic product
 - \$ 350 billion/year spent annually in the US
- But its economic significance is strangely out of step with its political status
 - School food systems as an example



Why food systems are important to urban, peri-urban and rural areas

- Food systems can integrate rural and urban communities through vibrant markets
- Improved food system integrity can address hunger, obesity, and other dietary and nutritional challenges facing cities
- Social benefits of access to affordable, healthy food in low income areas (gardens, schools, grocery stores ...)
- Food systems help stablize and grow local and regional economies

Why urban rural links?

 - Poverty alleviation and economic opportunity
