Complication:


- No recycling

Solution: Social waste management company


- Recycling and composting up to 80% of waste
- Innovative business model for lower income areas

Scaling late 2012:

- Industrial scale composting facility
- Geographic and client-type expansion

Goal 2015:

- 600,000 people served
- 40,000 tonnes of organic fertilizer produced per year

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
