After having identified a potential GIAHS site?



Preliminary work for writing a proposal

Step 1 Inform the community/ies to get consent and ensure commitment:

- organizing workshops, raising awareness activities
- including men and women
- establishing groups or focal points

Step 2 Identify the responsible institution/s:

- National government endorses and submit the proposal to FAO
- Governmental bodies ensure the commitment and overall implementation of activities after designation





Preliminary work for writing a proposal

Step 3

Establish multi-disciplinary working groups for the preparation of the proposal: local communities' leaders, rural economists, experts in environmental/living and social sciences, local stakeholders, etc.

And

Link the group/s with different governmental institutions: Min. of Agriculture, Min. of Tourism, Min. of Indigenous peoples/social affairs





Identify the main features against 5 Criteria

Global importance (uniqueness of the site)

- 1. Food and livelihood security
- 2. Agro-biodiversity
- 3. Traditional knowledge systems
- 4. Socio-cultural and other values
- 5. Landscape features





Step 1 Based on the study and description: identify threats, challenges and needs

Dynamic conservation actions =

- Actions to mitigate and address threat and challenges
- Actions to promote the sustainable development

Cover a large range of potential actions

- Knowledge transfer, capacity building, mechanization
- Labelling, food chain value, agro/gastro-tourism
- Communication, promotion and visibility support





Step 2

Set up a National Committee and identify the leaders/focal points Prepare a GIAHS National framework

- National committees with different ministries
- Local stakeholders, NGO, etc
- Local communities





Step 3

Map all relevant actors and stakeholders that may support the implementation of the action plan

- Potential fund providers / International funds
- Potential technical organizations
- On the ground actors already working in the area





Step 4

Based on the actions selected:

- Set concrete and realistic objectives to reach
- + mean of verification through a solid monitoring and evaluation plan
- Estimate costs, source for funds, timeline and sharing responsibilities: Get all relevant stakeholders on board, aware and engaged

GIAHS is a Holistic Approach focused on the community



Step 5 – Final approval among involved stakeholders

All the features of the GIAHS site and the activities identified for its conservation, should be based on the specific features and needs of the community with its direct involvement






